Dizy Terres Rouges Rosé 2011

The 2011 Extra-Brut Rosé Dizy-Terres Rouges is gorgeous. Aromatic and light on its feet, the 2011 is decidedly gracious and delicate in feel, and yet all the elements are nicely balanced. My only real critique of the 2011 is that it lacks mid-palate depth. At the same time, Jacquesson seems to have avoided the green notes that plague so many wines in this vintage. Disgorged November 2017 and bottled with no dosage.

Dizy Terres Rouges Rosé 2009

The 2009 Dizy-Terres Rouges Rosé is an unusual Champagne for Jacquesson in that is the first time this wine was bottled with no dosage. Crushed rose petal, tobacco, anise and star anise are all super-expressive, but the non-dosage style results in a powerful, almost tannic Rosé endowed with considerable structure and intensity. Readers should expect an intense Rosé that will offer its best drinking at the dinner table. Hints of crushed rose petal, tobacco, and star anise add the closing shades of nuance.

Dizy Terres Rouges Rosé 2008

Striking. An unusual, exotic wine, the 2008 is totally beguiling. Dried rose petals, pomegranate, sweet spices, mint and sweet tobacco meld into a core of beautifully textured, vinous fruit. In 2008, the Terres Rouge is truly a cross between Champagne and wine. I will not be surprised if the 2008 blossoms a bit more with time in bottle. Today, it is a bit compact, but that is not surprising for the year. In 2008, part of the juice was vinified saignée-style. In 2012, the house made this wine as a Blanc de Noirs, and that looks like the direction the Terre Rouge will take in the future. Readers who enjoy the Rosé version will not want to miss the 2008 while it is around.
